



Training of Trainers on International Law for Lao Judges 7 - 18 March 2011



The International Law Project organized a Training of Trainers on International Law for Lao judges in Vientiane (7-11 March 2011) and in Vangvieng (14-18 March 2011). 24 Judges from the People's Supreme Court, Regional High Courts and all 16 Provincial People's Courts and the People's Court of Vientiane Capital attended the two week training. The training was designed to build capacity of the Lao judiciary in the application of international law in courts in Laos. The trainers, upon completion of the training, will be able to give trainings on judicial application of international law for fellow judges across the country, thus build the Lao judiciary's capacity in an effort to build a Rule of Law State in accordance with the Legal Sector Master Plan (LSMP) adopted by the Lao Government.



The official opening of the TOT was graced by Hon. Khampha Sengdara, Vice President of the People's Supreme Court.

The training covered the areas of international law which are of most relevance to the judiciary as well as teaching skills and curriculum development for judicial training on international law.

- Mutual Legal Assistance in Criminal Matters;
- Transfer of Prisoners;
- International Law relating to Anti-Terrorism and Transnational Organization Crime;

The training of Trainers is a follow up to the preceding activities of the International Law Project relating to the judiciary. In March 2010 the International Law Project in collaboration The Hague Forum for Judicial Expertise with the generous support of the Dutch Embassy to Laos facilitated the dispatch of 18 Lao judges for training on international human rights law and international criminal law in The World Legal Capital. Shortly after Hague training, the International Law Project organized in May 2010 a Workshop devoted to the Right to a Fair Trial in collaboration with the International Commission of Jurists facilitated by ICJ experts, including a former UN Special Rapporteur on the Independence of the Judiciary.
